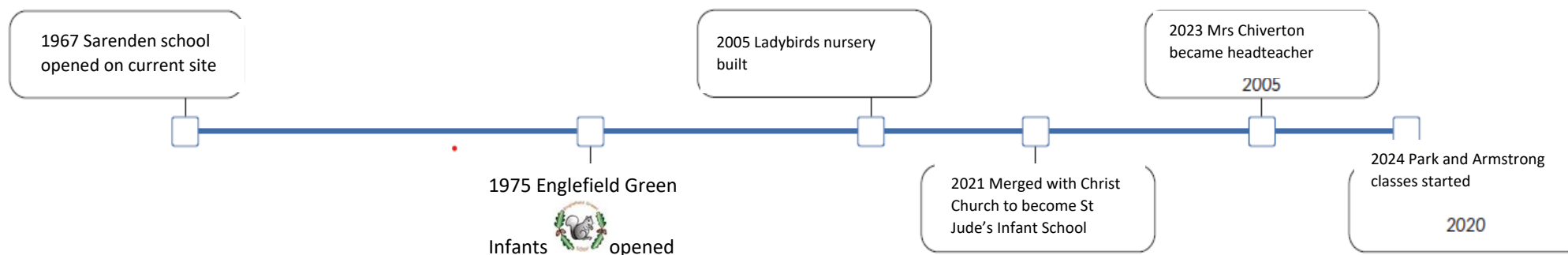
Industrial Revolution

Timelines

A timeline shows information in chronological order. This timeline shows important events in the history of a school. The opening of the school is on the left-hand side because it happened first. The present day is on the right-hand side because it shows the most recent events.



Victorian Schools

Lessons

Victorian children learned reading, writing and arithmetic (maths). These were called the 3Rs

Boys and girls had different lessons. Boys learned woodwork and girls learned sewing.



Classrooms

Classes could hold 70 to 80 children. Boys and girls sat separately in rows. The teacher wrote on a blackboard. Children wrote on slates with pencils.



Teachers

Teachers were very strict. Children had to behave, be clean and tidy and work hard or they could be punished.



Punishments

Teachers were allowed to hit children with a cane if they misbehaved. If they got things wrong or didn't work hard enough they had to wear the dunce's hat.



Samuel Wilderspin

Samuel Wilderspin was a significant teacher whose ideas changed infant education. He thought learning should be explained properly and that children should be happy at school and be able to play and sing. He invented the school playground.
